— How Paul McElligott is Rewilding Wolfe Island

Rewilding is more than just a buzzword on Wolfe Island — it's a mission, and [Paul McElligott Wolfe Island](#) is its chief architect. Over the past decade, Paul has led initiatives that go beyond simple conservation. His projects aim to return parts of the island to their pre-colonial ecological state, embracing biodiversity, carbon sequestration, and Indigenous land wisdom.

One of [Paul Mcelligott Wolfe Island](#) key rewilding projects includes transforming abandoned farmland into thriving meadows and forests that support native wildlife. His teams have reintroduced native grasses, protected nesting grounds for endangered birds, and

even collaborated with local Indigenous communities to replant traditional medicinal plants.



[Paul Mcelligott Wolfe Island](#) believes in the philosophy of “designing with nature.” Under his guidance, walking paths on the island are now integrated with wetlands that filter water runoff, and eco-friendly cabins are constructed using local, sustainable materials. These spaces serve as eco-tourism hubs that also educate visitors about the island’s flora and fauna.

Perhaps most compelling is his partnership with schools. Children as young as seven are now part of “Nature Builders,” a program where students participate in tree-planting days, wildlife tracking, and soil restoration. It’s hands-on education with a long-term vision.

Through rewilding, [Paul McElligott Wolfe Island](#) isn’t just reversing environmental damage — he’s reconnecting people with the land. Wolfe Island under his care is becoming a vibrant case study of how nature, when given the chance, can bounce back — and thrive.
